


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Laura Grace Dozer 1999-2008





MISSION

UCP of Central Arizona works to advance the independence, productivity and full citizenship of people with disabilities.



UCP is a part of one of the nation's largest health charities. For more than 60 years, we've assisted countless individuals with disabilities and their families one individual at a time. HOME AND COMMUNITY BASED SERVICES

Individuals with disabilities and their families receive a variety of useful services to afford them a more balanced and structured life.

Services include:

RESPITE

Short-term care and supervision. It gives caregivers a break during the day and can be provided up to thirteen hours per day.

ATTENDANT CARE

Assistance with personal hygiene and daily living activities, help in planning and preparing meals and maintaining a sanitary living environment. These services make it easier for some individuals with disabilities to remain at home and live independently.

HABILITATION

Teaching new skills to advance independence. Habilitative therapies, developmental instruction and behavior interventions are all designed to improve social skills, personal hygiene and other self-help skills as well as improve mobility and adaptive and independent living.

HOUSEKEEPING

Provides assistance in routine household maintenance and assistance with meal preparation.

INFORMATION AND REFERRAL

This program serves as a source of community support for individuals with disabilities and their families, as well as, a source for advocacy and person-centered support.

Our specialists find answers to questions regarding disability services and identify community outlets for families. They also serve as advocates in seeing families through the process of receiving the necessary services.

OUR PROGRAMS ARE DEDICATED TO ADVANCING THE INDEPENDENCE, PRODUCTIVITY AND SELF-SUFFICIENCY OF EACH INDIVIDUAL.

You will find that all of our programs are personalized and grow out of years of one-on-one experience in helping individuals realize their maximum potential.

EARLY INTERVENTION

Early detection is the key to addressing issues that can be more effectively managed if discovered sooner rather than later.

Early intervention serves infants and toddlers up to age three with developmental delays or disabilities. Teams of professionals work in partnership with families to identify the needs of the child. Then they provide services that support the child's growth, development, and learning. Programs are individualized for each child; They may include speech, occupational, and physical therapy, developmental instruction, and behavioral support from a social worker. These services are provided in the child's natural environment such as the home, or day care center.

EARLY LEARNING CENTER

School days are rewarding experiences for students and their families in this program. We apply the highest standards and utilize proven methods to prepare children for school.

The Early Learning Center serves children with and without disabilities from six weeks to five years of age. Our inclusive setting offers developmentally appropriate learning opportunities for all children. Our preschool program utilizes The Creative Curriculum, a nationally recognized curriculum that incorporates Arizona's Early Childhood Education Standards. Our Early Learning Center is accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC).

THERAPY SERVICES

Therapists work to develop fine and gross motor skills, sensory integration, and communication. In this highly professional program.

We provide Occupational, Physical, and Speech therapies to children and adults in a variety of settings. Our therapists work as a team to develop and implement treatment plans designed so each individual is able to meet their optimal level of independence in their daily activities.

DAY TREATMENT AND TRAINING AND SUMMER PROGRAM

The practical daily living approach at our after school and summer program is to assist each individual in reaching their full potential.

These services are provided to children and young adults ages 3-21 with disabilities. Typically, the program maintains a ratio of one staff member for every three clients. However, in special situations a one on one ratio can be provided. Training includes personal hygiene, decision making, socialization, meal planning and cooking, money management, and computer skills. Children and young adults are exposed to many real-life situations through field trips to movies, malls, museums, libraries, community recreation areas, an adaptive swimming pool, and special community events.

Every activity is designed to develop new skills or assist in retention of learned skills. Services are delivered on the basis of a needs assessment. An individual service plan is developed by a team including the individual, parent, Support Coordinator, and UCP Program staff.

DAY TREATMENT FOR ADULTS

This program serves high school graduates or adults with disabilities and helps them develop the skills necessary to live more independent and self-sufficient lives.

Designed to enhance community integration, physical health, and employment skills, the program also provides activities of daily living and socialization opportunities. Participants plan meals, shop and prepare lunch, go on outings to the mall, movies, restaurants, and volunteer at community organizations. They play basketball, dance, learn karate, create art projects, and play computer games. All activities support the goals of each client's individual service plan and vary depending on each individual's abilities.

EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

The program goal is to extend the individual's participation into the general community through meaningful employment. Individuals seeking employment, job training, or wishing to explore work opportunities for the first time are served through this program. Individual job coaches work with clients to determine their skills, interests, and talents. Then, training and education is provided to assist individuals in successfully obtaining competitive employment.
